

We applaud our Class of 2021 and their teachers for the hard work and dedication they have shown through another challenging year of upheaval and disruption. They have all responded with maturity, integrity and respect for each other, exemplifying our HEROIC core values.

Individually, we wish to celebrate our Dux of Boys' Grammar, Jeremy Southwell (ATAR: 98.25) and Dux of Girls' College, Anfisa Matsak (ATAR: 94.1) for their hard work and diligence these past two years.

Commendations also go to the forty-one percent of students who reached the Distinguished Achievers list, achieving Band 6 or a mark of 90+ across 36 subject mentions, including our two Year 11 students who achieved Band 6 results in Studies of Religion.

I am pleased to report that ninety percent of the cohort had received early entry to their chosen university course before they had sat their first exam, with one quarter of those in receipt of multiple university offers.

Of the six students that had not received early entry, four were accepted into courses at universities that do not offer early entry, and two have chosen to pursue opportunities outside of university education.

HSC results alone do not demonstrate the individual academic growth of each of our students, or the care and support provided by staff to ensure each student fulfils their academic potential, particularly following the extended period of remote learning and the delayed exam conditions this year.

Increasingly, universities are selecting students with a more holistic view – certainly including their aptitude to learn, but also their interests and strengths. I commend this cohort for their dedication to community service work, their broad range of interests and pursuits, and the strong leadership skills they have shown.

I encourage you to read the stories of these individuals on the pages that follow, so that you may gain some insight into their experience at Pittwater House, and their bright and evolving futures.

We certainly wish them every success in whatever post-school pathway they choose to take.

What was your favourite subject and why?

My favourite subject in Years 11 and 12 was Economics because it enabled me to think critically and strategically and gain fundamental decision-making skills. Economics taught me the importance of analysing the costs and benefits of each decision and the need to assess those costs and benefits to come up with the most optimal outcome. My fantastic teacher, Ms Leman, made Economics fascinating and entertaining, inspiring me to work hard for it and continue studying it at university.

What co-curricular or other activities/practices did you do to balance your commitment to your studies?

It was crucial for me to balance my lifestyle and participate in different activities during my studies so that I did not focus all my time and attention on academics and burn myself out. I joined the basketball team, which helped me to relax and take a break from the mental work through physical activity. I was also the head of the Sustainability Group which allowed me to gain essential leadership and organisational skills.

How did your teachers contribute to your success?

My teachers taught me the skills and knowledge required for the subject, but also went above and beyond to make sure I understood the topic. As they were so committed to helping me achieve my best results, I maintained a good relationship with them and treated them with respect.

What advice would you give students undertaking their HSC in 2022?

Stay organised, get into a routine and make notes throughout the year so that by the time the exams come up, you are just revising and practising different questions. I would also suggest going through syllabus points for each subject, which can be found on the NESA website, to ensure you are not missing any information.

What was your favourite subject and why?


